Herbert Protocol

The Herbert Protocol is an essential tool designed to enhance the safety and well-being of individuals living with dementia. Recently, this protocol has been made even more accessible through an online platform, allowing families and caregivers to easily register their loved ones.

What is the Herbert Protocol?

The Herbert Protocol is a scheme developed to help manage situations where vulnerable individuals, particularly those with dementia, may go missing. It provides a structured approach for families to collect and store critical information about the individual, such as medical history, medication details, physical descriptions, and emergency contacts. This information can then be quickly shared with emergency services if the person goes missing.

Colburn and Richmond Knife amnesty bins!

The knife drop bin initiative allows members of the public to safely and anonymously dispose of bladed articles.

Wrap the knife in either cardboard or newspaper

Secure with strong tape and ensure it is sealed to prevent injuries during disposal

Go directly to your nearest knife bin location, carefully place your knife in the hatch marked with arrows and shut once deposited

Measures to combat the threat of knife crime are to be stepped up across North Yorkshire after calls from communities to help keep their streets safe. Knife crime is a national problem, and amnesties like this help to get dangerous weapons off the streets without putting members of the public in danger.

Would you like to host a property marking event in your village?

Your Richmond Neighbourhood Policing Team, were with the Swaledale Outdoor Club assisting in property marking using our Dot Peen machine on numerous bikes. What a great turnout it was with marking a total of 27 bikes throughout the event.

Dot peen marking involves using a tungsten carbide-tipped pin to indent an object with dots to create a visible, permanent unique number or word. This removes scratching of paint on items which isn't always effective. This unique marking is then stored on a database in which if we are able to locate stolen property, we would be able to reunite with its original owner. Property is also marked with a sticker to show that the item has been marked in order to help deter any criminality.

Items to be marked can include, but not limited to, bikes, computer equipment, horse tac, tools or any items you feel maybe susceptible to theft. The machine will not mark glass or ceramic.
